

CREWS CLEAN UP GEORGIA'S WORST RAILROAD WRECK

HAZLEHURST, Ga., Oct. 10. — Crews cleaned up the wreckage of Georgia's worst rail disaster in 11 years to permit resumption of service today on Southern Railway's single line track into Hazlehurst, 180 miles southeast of Atlanta.

Two Southern trains, a passenger and a freight, slammed together on a curve Saturday, killing five trainmen and injuring a dozen persons, none seriously.

Wrecking crews spent all day yesterday clearing away the debris while thousands of spectators watched.

Railway authorities were investigating the cause of the head-on collision but had not issued any official explanation. Trainmen and police reported that passenger train was 50 minutes behind schedule when the crash occurred on a curve with limited visibility.

Killed on the freight train were engineer W. D. Sharpe, Jesup, conductor C. M. Ribi Peele, Robert; and trainman J. E. Hancock, Macon. Passenger train crewmembers killed were engineer Newt G. Askew, Macon, and fireman B. J. Johnson, Macon.

Four of the 18 passengers were injured. The other eight injured were trainmen.

The worst rail disaster on record in Georgia occurred on July 9, 1934, near Stockton when 47 persons were killed.

New Atom Test Series Reported Slated in Nevada

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. — Planning is reported under way for a new series of atomic tests next month at the Nevada Proving Grounds.

The reports, which had no official confirmation, were that the proposed tests might involve change in some existing devices and might provide further information on radioactive fallout.

There was speculation that additional information on either of both of those points might be a part of preparations for a new series of hydrogen tests in the Marshall Island testing grounds next year.

The new Nevada test series, it was understood is being planned on only a small scale. At the conclusion of the spring series, observers were given to understand no further tests were planned there this year.

The possibility remained, however, that laboratory work since then has shown a need for further limited testing, perhaps of a new bomb triggering device or some other change, which could best be done at the continental testing grounds.

The Atomic Energy Commission announced two weeks ago that Russia had set off another atomic test. Those in charge of developing nuclear weapons for this country have contended that constant improvement must be sought as long as there is no international agreement to outlaw atomic explosions.

Arms Inspection Can Unite World, Stassen Asserts

TOPEKA, Kan., Oct. 10. — Harold F. Stassen says he is convinced the adoption of a dependable arms inspection disarmament plan "can well prove to be the magnet which will draw the East and West together in a genuine spirit of cooperation."

He said "heartening results" had come out of the recent United Nations subcommittee meetings on disarmament at which he represented the United States.

In a talk at a citywide Protestant laymen's rally last night, he said: "I am optimistic because mankind has never faced the extreme alternatives of today. On the one side, if man stumbles into nuclear war, the unimaginable devastation of that conflict could set back civilization by centuries. On the other side, if assured peace is attained, the beneficial results of this same nuclear energy will advance human welfare in all nations beyond man's dreams."

Stassen said the general principle of arms inspection had been accepted and "the inspection procedures outlined by the President are being reviewed carefully by the Soviet leaders along with provisions for ground inspection."

He added that immediate results should not be expected since "many other difficult and major differences must be ironed out."

Military Trial Ordered for Bell

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10. — Disregarding legal maneuvers to transfer the case to civilian courts, the Army said former Cpl. Otto G. Bell, a turncoat soldier who returned home after casting his lot with Communist China, must stand a military court martial.

The army said yesterday the 24-year-old, onetime Mississippi farm hand, now a resident of Olympia, Wash., will be tried on charges of collaborating with the enemy while a prisoner of war in North Korea. No date was set.

Bell is imprisoned at nearby Ft. Baker.

Specifically, the Army accused Bell of informing on and mistreating fellow prisoners. It said it could ask for the death penalty but won't.

Of an attempt by Bell's lawyers to transfer the case to federal court, the Army said "for the alleged offenses, Bell is not now subject to trial in federal or state civil courts."

He's 60 Now I Would Retire Tomorrow If I Had the Money -- Keaton

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 10. — Deadpan comic Buster Keaton, marking his 60th birthday, remains active in all fields of show business.

But he adds, "Just give me enough money for a couple of acres in the valley and I'd chuck the whole works."

This is a refreshing contrast to the show biz veterans who feel the show must go on and on and on. Buster says he would retire tomorrow, if he only had the loot.

He made this reflection while preparing for the NBC spectacular "Show Biz." A regular guest star on most TV variety shows, Buster has also averaged two tours of Europe each year for the past six years.

His film career is also perking again. Today he was scheduled to leave for Oklahoma to continue locations for Mike Todd's "Around the World in 80 Days." He plays the conductor on an oldtime train crossing the prairie.

And Paramount is getting set to film "The Buster Keaton Story," a hilarious tale of his rise from vaudeville to movie fame. They're thinking of casting Donald O'Connor or George Gobel in the title role. Buster approves of either.

Gobel For Laughs

"Gobel would get more laughs," Buster observed. "But O'Connor would be better for the action. He's a dancer and could handle my kind of knock-about comedy."

They even talk about having Buster play his own father, but he doesn't think much of the idea. "It would be like having Al Jolson play his Rabbi Father in 'The Jolson Story,'" he remarked. "It would be like helping to build your own monument."

Despite all this activity, Buster declared he was in no financial shape to retire.

"You can't really make much out of European tours," said Buster, whose pantomime act makes a hit in France, Italy, Belgium and other countries. "I've done more TV guest spots than most stars. I've been on Ed Sullivan's Show four times, the Comedy Hour five times and I'm the only one who has been on What's My Line twice. "But you do a shot and then lay off two months. You can't save money that way."

Little Is Left

Keaton has earned millions in his film career, which dates back to 1921. But he has little to show for it.

What happened?

Bad investments, high living, a divorce. These three combined to make him flat broke.

"Whenever I made investments on my own, I came out all right," he said sadly. "But when I went in with someone, I lost my shirt."

He told of joining Sid Grauman, Joseph Schenck, Irving Berlin, Irving Thalberg and others on the building of the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel. All were wiped out. Then they joined forces for a housing development in San Diego. Again a total loss. Keaton's share: \$100,000.

His divorce from Natalie Talmade disposed of much of his fortune. She was awarded their \$300,000 home in Beverly Hills, now occupied by the James Masons.

"I didn't find out until after the divorce that my wife's expenses outside of household costs, were \$900 a week," he recalled. "I discovered she had 42 charge accounts around town."

Now expecting his fifth grandchild, Keaton lives comfortably in his Los Angeles home with his young wife. Both are avid cooks, and Buster spends his spare time working in the garden.

Freight Derails Near Herkimer; Traffic Slowed

HERKIMER, Oct. 10. — New York Central Railroad passenger trains moved at reduced speed along a single track today while workmen rushed to clear debris from a freight derailment blocking other tracks of the main line.

The railroad said 43 cars of an 83-car eastbound train jumped the tracks about a mile west of here yesterday and delayed passenger trains for as much as five hours. No one was injured.

The train, pulled by three Diesel engines, was traveling about 34 miles an hour when a car about 30 feet from the engines jumped a track and pulled the others off.

Wreckage was strewn over about a quarter-mile of the railroad's four main line tracks. Wrecked cars were piled three deep in some spots.

A reporter said they looked as though a stack of dominoes had been knocked over.

A railroad signal tower was knocked down, cutting off the Central's communications.

Two empty tank cars struck pillars of a long bridge carrying the New York State Thruway over the Mohawk River, the railroad tracks and Route 5, state police said. Damage to the bridge was described as slight. There was no interruption of traffic on the thruway.

RIOT-TORN PLANT IS KEPT CLOSED; PARLEY ORDERED

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 10. — Gov. George N. Craig kept the violence-torn Perfect Circle Corp. foundry closed today and called union and management officials to a showdown truce parley.

He promised to clamp full martial law on the city of New Castle, Ind., if more shotgun battles are threatened at the strikebound foundry there.

The plant, closed since nine persons were injured in a gun fight between strikers and non-strikers Wednesday, had been scheduled to reopen today. Leaders of the striking CIO United Auto Workers had said no demonstrations were planned and 600 National Guardsmen were standing by to make sure of it.

But Craig rushed home from a Florida fishing vacation late yesterday, and took personal command of the tension-packed crisis. Using the veiled threat of martial law, he asked no change in the status quo until after his meeting with the company and union men this afternoon.

He advised them to "pray for guidance" before coming to the meeting and to be ready to talk about a settlement.
