Beauty at Home

Q — Is there any physical thing I can do to encourage more growth and more thickness in my eyelashes?

A — You can give your lashes some nourishment by making a nightly practice of applying some lanolin or baby oil containing lanolin to your lids at the roots of the hairs, using a small, soft brush. Another good treatment — for stimulation — is the practice of tugging gently at the lashes every now and then.

Q — My hair is of a rather dry texture. Is it wise for me

to dry it, after my shampoo, under an electric dryer?

A — Better not, since this tends to make the hair even drier. Hand-drying is much more desirable. Use a rough towel for drying the hair, then brush it vigorously. This stimulates the scalp and activates normal oil secretion.

Q — Have you any makeup suggestions for the girl with a very pointed chin?

A — If she will use a highlighting (lighter) base at the point, she will impart the appearance of fullness to her chin.

How Can I?

Q — How can I remove rust stains from white washable materials?

A — Spread the stain over a vessel of boiling water. Squeeze lemon juice or tomato juice on the stain and allow it to remain a few minutes. Then rinse in hot water. Repeat process several times. Or, moisten the stain with salt and lemon juice and place in the sun, adding lemon juice as it dries, or hold over the spout of a steaming teakettle.

Q — Can you suggest an efficient way to prepare steaks that are to be served rare, medium, and well-done?

A — You can do this all at the same time and in the same length of time by placing on the broiler tray completely frozen foods for rare, partially-thawed steaks for medium, and unfrozen steaks for well-done.

Q — How can I remove tar stains from some of my nylon stockings?

A — Rub some butter on the stains with a piece of cloth until the stains disappear. Then launder.

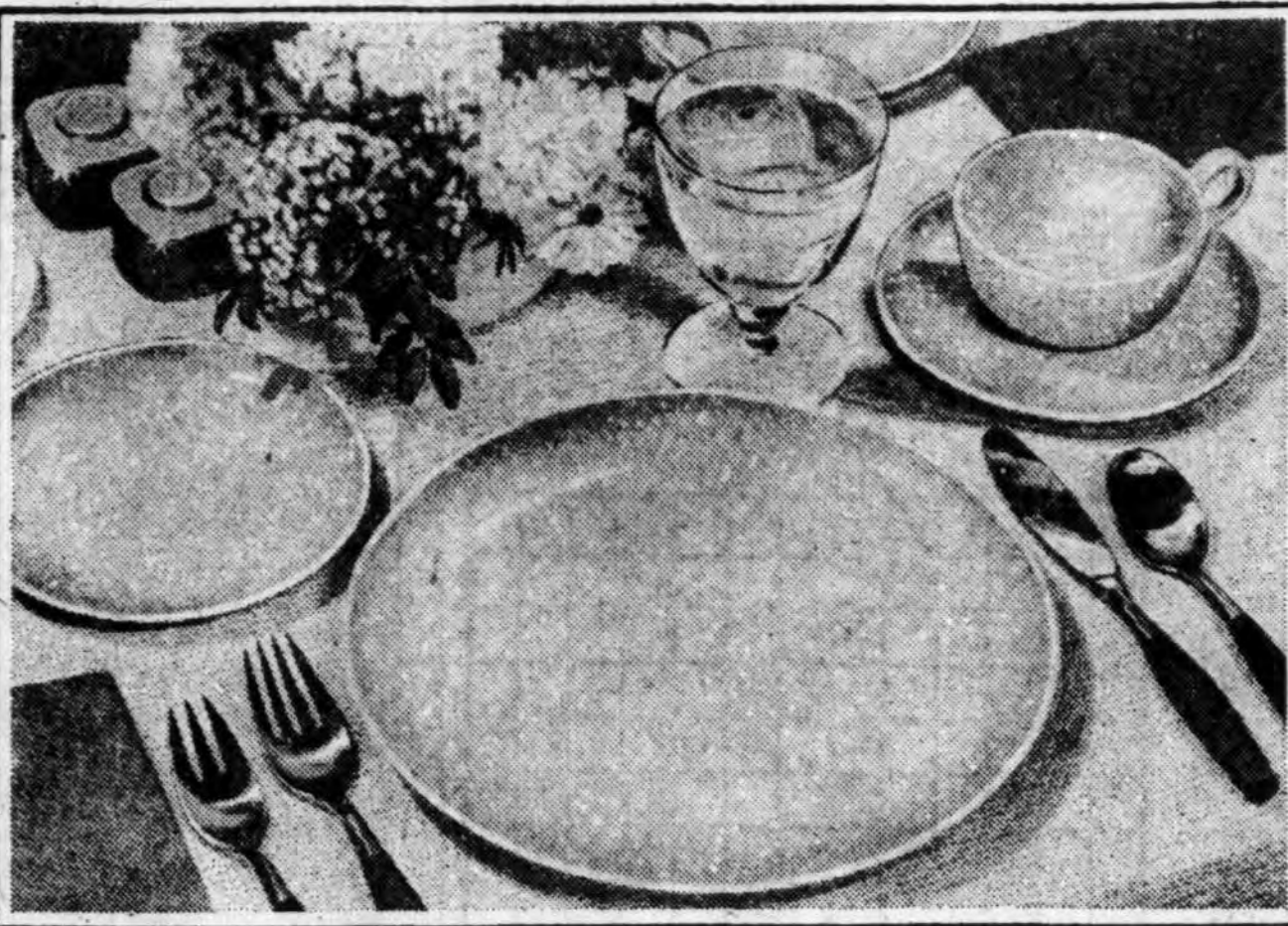


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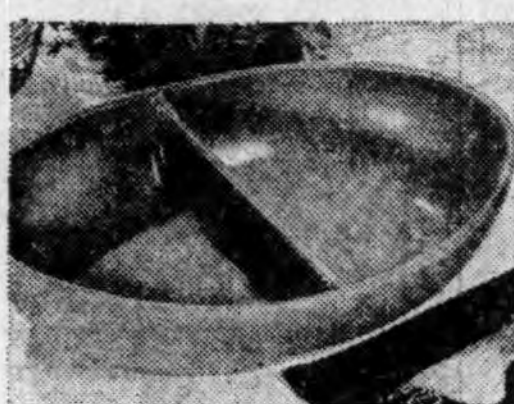
