U. OF R. ASSISTANT COACH TO REFEREE

Will Officiate At Game With Medina Friday Night

Tomorrow (Friday) night the Medina High School quint will invade the local hardwood in a return engagement of the home-and-home series in the Genesee-Orleans "A" League. The locals under Coach Karlton Davis will be seeking revenge for the 23 to 21 defeat handed them in Medina early in the season.

The feature of tomorrow evening's encounter will be Wilbur V. Hubbard of the University of Rochester who will officiate at the game. Hubbard came to Rochester two years ago with Dudley DeGroot from San Jose State College, California, and is DeGroot's chief assistant football coach. Besides this, Hubbard coaches the University freshman team, which thus far in the season has been very successful.

Holley will be at its best for the test against the winners of the first half of league play. Holley is now first place in the second half with Oakfield, who has won three games and lost none, while Holley has won only two. Oakfield draws a bye in the league this week and will journey to Batavia to meet the Blue Devils. A week from tomorrow night, Holley will travel to Oakfield in a game which will probably decide the championship of the second half.

Coach Davis will probably start Johnny Pera and Junior Ruger at the forward posts, Louis DePhillips at center and Captain Pete Alland and Howard Larnder at the guard posts.

The preliminary game will get underway at 7:30 with the main game scheduled for 8:30.

Victory Garden Council

Is Organized At Meeting

A Victory Garden meeting, which was attended by twenty-two representatives of various county organizations was held Monday evening, February 16 at the Court House in Albion.

The group constituted themselves as the Orleans County Victory Garden Council and elected Earl Harding, farmer, R.F.D. 1, Albion, as permanent chairman with Rodney Lightfoot as secretary. Other members of the steering committee are Mrs. Catherine Bartlett, Albion, County Home Bureau agent; Mrs. Barbara Byrne, Albion, chairman of the County Nutrition Committee; and Edward Davis, vice-principal of the Medina High School.

The council feels that the emphasis of the Victory Garden program in this county should be upon better gardens and that instructional materials should be put in the hands of all families on the subject of supplying the families' nutritional needs and upon garden practices.

It was also felt that a lot of high pressure should not be used to get everybody regardless of their gardening experience or garden facilities to have a garden and that all possible means of publicity on the subject of good nutrition and good gardening should be used such as circular letters, newspaper articles, etc.

Public To See Free Movie

Because "it can happen here," a double feature free movie to prepare families in the defense of their homes will be given at the Albion Village Hall, Thursday evening, February 26 at 8 o'clock.

The first picture will be the film "Incendiary Bombs" which shows what preparations families should make to meet such emergency should the occasion arise. Since the woman of the family would be more apt to be at home at such times than her husband, homemakers are especially urged to see this picture.

The second picture is entitled "Meat and Romance." This is the story of some newlyweds, starting with their first meal in their new house, and includes information on how to buy meat, how to cook and carve it, and the nutritional value of it.

In an entertaining way this picture offers valuable information which will help men and women choose and use reasonably priced meats to meet their nutritional needs for Physical Fitness.

As a third feature of the evening's program, Mrs. Carl Bergerson of Albion has been obtained to give a short talk on "Food for Physical Fitness." Her talk will supplement the film on meats and demonstrate a simple method for checking the foods included in the day's meals to make sure they are meeting the daily nutritional requirements for health.

This meeting, which is planned for all men and women and young people in and about Albion, is being sponsored by the Albion Senior Unit of the Orleans County Home Bureau under the leadership of Mrs. Tiffany Denniston.

SCHOOLS TO HANDLE SUGAR RATIONING

Tentative Registration Dates Have Been Set By State

Tentative dates for sugar registration have been announced by Maurice F. Neufeld, state rationing director. They are:

Wholesalers, retailers and industries—the evenings of March 9th and 10th at high schools.

Consumers—The evenings of March 18th and 21st, inclusive, at all schools.

"Trade registration will be conducted at high schools. Registration will be held in the evenings and will not interfere with the normal flow of school business. I realize that in asking the school authorities to undertake the initial job of registering applicants for rationing books, we are adding additional work to their numerous functions.

"In requesting the teachers to take over the novel task of distributing rationing books, however, it has been felt they were probably better fitted for this particular job than anyone else. They know most people within the jurisdictional area of their schools."

The latter told Ruggles that he was traveling north on the Hulberton Road when the boy, walking north on the left side of the road, darted across the road and was struck by his front fender. The accident occurred in front of the residence of Thomas Vincella.
