

HEARST MAY BE SPEAKER AT THE HAMBURG FAIR

Conservation of forests and game likely to be his topic next Wednesday.

EXHIBITS OF WILD LIFE

Sportmen and farmers interested in new display at the county fair.

William Randolph Hearst "probably will be one of the speakers at the Erie County fair at Hamburg next week," James C. Brennan, president of the Erie County Society for the Protection of Fish and Game, who is supervising the arrangement of the exhibits that will be housed in the new conservation building, has been in communication with him and it is likely that Mr. Hearst will be here on Wednesday to speak on a conservation subject.

Wednesday of the fair week will be known as Conservation day. Speakers of national prominence will point out the importance of reforestation and other means for the conservation of the natural resources of the country.

The exhibits of fish and game mounted and live birds it will contain the most complete exhibit of the kind in the state. The building has been located in a natural setting and according to conservation experts who have inspected it, the site would not have been more ideal. Among those who have inspected it in the last week are Alexander MacDonald, conservation commissioner of the state who will probably be at the fair some day next week, Llewellyn J. Rogers, chief of the division of forestry, Sumner Corden, superintendent of the state fish hatcheries, Clifford Pettit, state superintendent of lands and forests and the state foresters of Massachusetts and Pennsylvania who stopped off here on their way from a convention of foresters in the West.

Superintendent Corden has assured President Brennan that the state will be at the fair with a display of fish and game. The state superintendent of lands and forests has detailed one of his deputies, Samuel E. Davis, to the fair during the entire week. He will answer questions referring to reforestation. An employee of the state conservation commission will receive complaints as to violations of the game laws. He will also use the opportunity to become acquainted with the sportsmen and farmers of the county.

The division of forestry has sent a shipment of trees, consisting of pine, Scotch fir, red cedar and Norway spruce which will be used to demonstrate reforestation methods.

Mr. Brennan makes the prediction that there will be more visitors at the conservation building than at any other at the fairgrounds. This prediction is based on the fact that at other affairs, which have exhibited of this kind, there are several thousand members of the Erie County Society for the Protection of Fish, Game and the organizations that are affiliated with it. These organizations will have representatives at the conservation building during the entire week.

One side of the building will be given up entirely to exhibits by the Buffalo Society of Natural Sciences. Every day there will be moving picture illustrating outdoor life.

CAPT. W. D. F. LEUSHNER PLACED ON ACTIVE DUTY

Washington, D. C., Aug. 23.—Under special orders of the war department, Captain William D. F. Leushner, regular army reserve corps, 102, Tillinghast place, Buffalo, is placed on active duty at Camp Perry, Ohio, as instructor in citizens military training beginning on September 15. Captain Leushner is superintendent of the army of the 174th infantry. During the war he commanded a company of the 52d infantry. He ranks very high as a rifleman.

FALLS MAN AND WIFE HELD ON MURDER CHARGE

Alleged to have caused death of boarder who was behind on payments.

Trotter gives alibi. Proves he was not man, although wife of patrolman gives identification.

Niagara Falls, Aug. 23.—William Kostick and his wife, Mary, were remanded to Welland jail until August 31st, for trial on charges of murder, by Magistrate Alack Fraser in police court, Niagara Falls, Ont., today. They are alleged to have caused the death of Peter Novoski, 48 years old, who died last night in the General hospital, Niagara Falls, Ont., from internal injuries said to have been inflicted by the Kosticks. Novoski is said to have owed the Kosticks a board bill. He tried to get his trunk out of the couple's house at Falls View on Saturday and was attacked by the man and woman. It is claimed that Kostick allegedly had been kicked into the abdomen several times. Mrs. Kostick is said to have joined her husband in the assault. Neighbors say that the quarrel continued in the Kostick home for several hours. It was interrupted by the police who arrested the Kosticks and sent Novoski to the hospital.

No long-term franchises for operation of business in this city were granted by the city council in a private meeting of the council last night in any criterion. Three applications for business have been received by the council. They are from Dennis Rhoney, R. J. O'Reilly and the Niagara Falls Jitney Owners' association. They some twenty-year franchises but these are not favored by the council.

Trotter was arrested on description and is said to have been identified by Mrs. Whitmore. She identified him in court today, also.

Curry relative to the body of the youth taken from the Niagara river at the Canadian Maid of the Mist landing recently. Mr. Nicholson believes it may be that of his son who left home on August 1st and has not been heard from since. He said that the description of the body recovered today is quite closely with that of his missing son.

Johnson of Rochester, the Nuway Stores corporation's principal creditor, made the petition for the receivership. The firm has a chain of grocery stores in Rochester.

SOME STRATEGY NEEDED

It seems there are lads pledged to both sides and sitting tight.

A day off was taken by the Democratic factions yesterday. An examination yesterday of petitions filed at the bureau of elections disclosed some of the cross currents of the contest to be waged between the organization under William H. Fitzpatrick and the Democratic League under Louis P. Fuhrmann. The same names appear in many instances on both tickets. As an example, in the second ward the names of Supervisor John C. O'Leary, John J. Prawley and Michael Lapenna are on both tickets. The league filed only one candidate for city commissioner in a number of districts and in some did not file any names. The sixteenth ward is a prominent example. The league leaders say that where committee men came to them and said they were against the organization, opposition tickets were not filed. The organization also appears to be shy of candidates in spots, but has not many vacancies as the league has.

Outside the city, the league appears to have filed names of candidates for committeemen at Lackawanna, Grand Island, Evans, Lancaster and North Collins, but not in all districts. On the issue of delegates to the state convention and state committeemen, the league has a full ticket and it is upon those lines the primary will be fought out. It is admitted on both sides that there are candidates for the county committee pledged both ways.

Motorist speeds away after hitting street-car man in Syracuse street.

The bandits took \$9 and a suitcase from Moon and a handbag from Colby. Both men had to go to the Emergency hospital. They were cut and bruised.

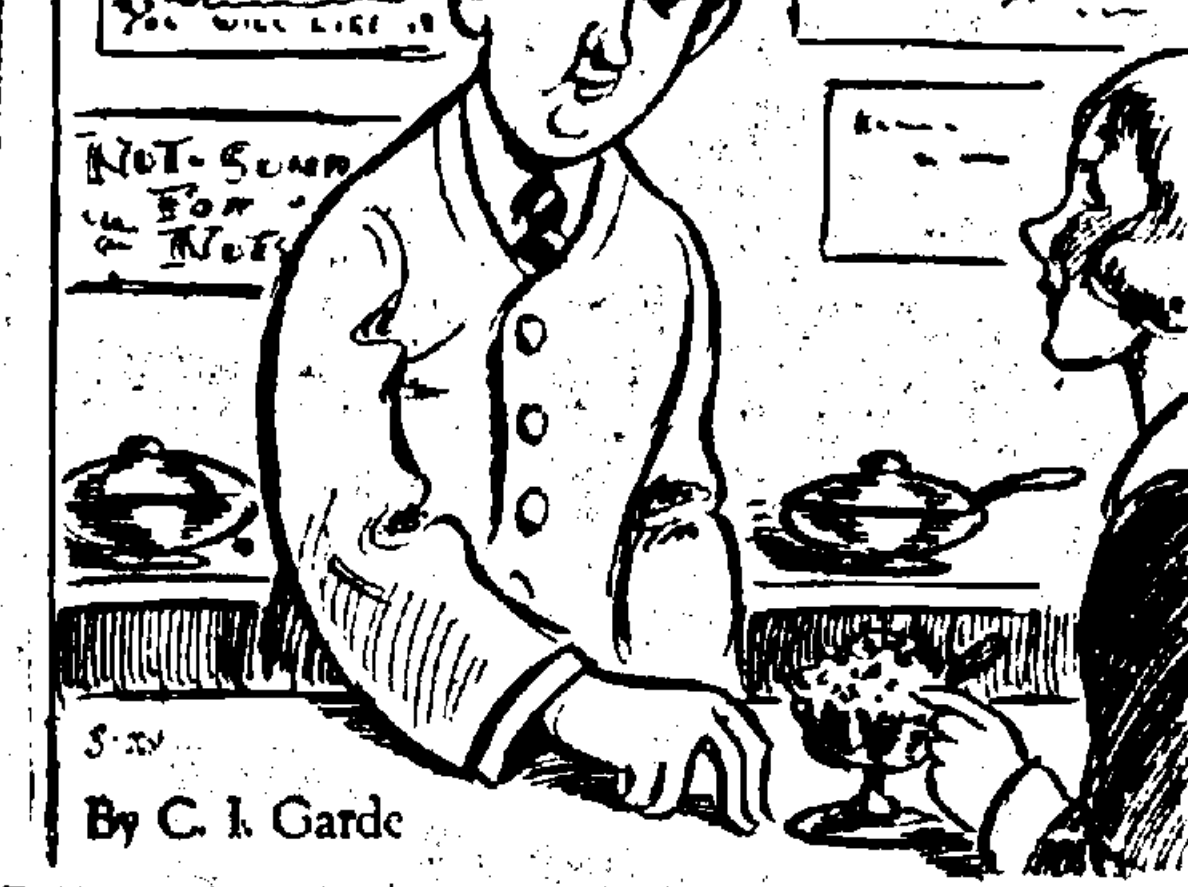
HORNELL SHOP WORKER FOUND DEAD IN PIT; WELT ACROSS HEAD

Hornell, Aug. 23.—Thomas Gill of New York, who arrived here recently to work in the Erie railroad shops, was found dead this morning, his body floating in an ash pit, reports received here say. Four feet of water was in the pit at the time.

There was an ugly welt across the man's head, but Coroner Otto K. Stewart has been unable to determine whether Gill was struck over the head and his body thrown into the pit or fell accidentally while at work. He began an inquiry this morning, but could find no witnesses who had seen Gill near the pit, the man having been assigned to work in another part of the shop. Gill arrived yesterday with a group of new workers from New York. He gave his occupation as a chauffeur.

STRIKING CAR MAN APPEALS ASSAULT CASE

Justice Dudley grants motion for rehearing of Wilson's conviction.

CAN'T GET OUT OF PEN

Court refuses to grant reasonable doubt certificate after hearing motions.

Justice Dudley last night granted a motion for an appeal of the city court conviction against Burt Wilson, 42 years old, of No. 150 Woodlawn avenue. Wilson was convicted on Monday by a jury of assaulting Nate Parker, a negro cook at the Cold Spring barn, and was sentenced to 30 days in the workhouse. Wilson is a striking street car conductor.

Justice Dudley also heard argument on an application for a certificate of reasonable doubt. He rejected the application. The application for a certificate of reasonable doubt was made by Alex. Taylor, counsel for Wilson, in an effort to have Wilson released on bail pending the appeal. The appeal will be argued before Judge Noonan in county court today.

Mr. Taylor based his argument for the appeal on Judge Lamson's charge to the city court jury. He said he asked the jury to give a verdict of the decision. Walter P. Hofheins, assistant district attorney, opposed both motions.

HARRIS STOCK SALE TRIAL NEXT MONTH

The trial of Mark H. Harris, broker, with offices in the Mutual Life building will be held in federal court at Canandaigua next month, according to a notice served by counsel of Christian J. Larson of Charleston, S. C., who is bringing suit against Harris for selling worthless stock. According to the notice, Harris represented a stock issue, that after he bought \$5,000 worth of it he found the stock to be worthless. Postoffice inspectors have been investigating the sale of the stock.

Fires revolver, loses job.

Frederick Vetter of No. 287 Genesee street, a former guard for the street car company, drew a suspended sentence before Judge Peter Maul yesterday for the careless use of firearms. On Thursday he was arrested for discharging a revolver in a garage in Potter street. Judge Maul ordered the case investigated. Chief Beutend revoked the man's permit and dismissed him from the special force.
