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Farm taxes and other taxing items

the NYS Tax Department. A couple of things to remember are 1) farms that did not make 1992's estimated tax payments by January 15, 1993, are supposed to file their income tax by March 1, 1993. Those that did make the estimated tax payments have until April 15, 1993, to file, and 2) all employers, including farm employers, have until March 1, 1993 to file their from W-3, Transmittal of Income and Tax Statements, along with the copy A of all the forms W-2 issued for 1992.

Another tax related item of interest to farm employers is that IRS now has new payroll tax deposit rules. Stuart Smith, Senior Exten-

eral employment taxes during 1991 must deposit 1993 federal employment taxes by the 15th of the following month. The old rule stated that no deposit was necessary until there were at least \$500 of these taxes accumulated.

IRS is allowing a grace period for farm employers to get adjusted to the new deposit rules. They are saying that farm employers may continue to use the old system during 1993, but conversion to the new system must be complete by December 31, 1993. The only exception to the new rule is a farm employer who accumulates less than \$500 in employment taxes for a



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year. In this case, the entire deposit may be made at the end of the year. Farm operators should be aware that the entire payroll for the year would have to be less than \$1700 in order to be exempt from this new schedule. Farm employers who reported over \$50,000 in employment taxes have more frequent deposit deadlines.

Another tax item to act upon now is the Agricultural Assessment. If a farm operator wants to take advantage of the agricultural assessment rate for property taxes, application must be made through the local assessor by March 1, 1993. I urge those who intend to apply to do so prior to the deadline so there is time for all the paperwork to be done in a timely manner. For example, farms not in an agricultural district must first file an 8 year commitment to agriculture with

the county clerk, then must apply for the agricultural assessment, and must get a soils classification worksheet completed by the Soil Conservation District so the agricultural assessment rate can be approved. Since all this takes time, please start the process as early as possi-

One last item to mention is that dairy farmers who produced less milk in 1992 than in 1991 are entitled to a refund on their dairy assessment, which was withheld from milk checks during last year Since the assessment rate for most of 1992 was 13.5¢ per hundredweight, a refund could amount to some substantial dollars. Applications for this refund are being taken through March 15, 1993, at the ASCS office in Belmont.
