Beauty At Home

Q — Will you please explain the reason acne, or facial pimples, is an affliction suffered mostly by teenagers, instead of adults?

A — In the teens, the oil glands are always over-active, and acne thrives on oily skins. Daily washings with tincture of green soap will help to dry the skin, and a bland, non-greasy diet featuring quantities of fresh fruits and vegetables helps lots to purify the bloodstream. The doctor can help you with your skin, and if it is in pretty bad shape, it is best to consult him.

Q — How can I keep my naturally light-colored hair light-looking?

A — Shampoo your light hair more frequently. Avoiding tar soap or sage tea, which are for dark tresses only. Oily lotions are also taboo. A shampoo of castile soap jelly is very good. After this, dry the hair quickly. An after - shampoo rinse of camomile leaves helps also to prevent darkening. Use this as a final rinse.

Q — Is it possible, through the strategic use of base makeup, to camouflage arm faults, just as one can do with facial defects?

A — Yes, by the artful blending of two shades of the base. A darker foundation cream will help disguise a too-large upper arm, while the girl with skinny, "pipe-stem" arms will find that a lighter shade of foundation seemingly adds plumpness.

How Can I?

Q — How can I darken some light tan leather articles, such as belts, shoes, and the like?

A — By rubbing them with a cloth dipped in ammonia. This gives the leather a deep brown finish. Be sure, however, to apply the ammonia uniformly so that your finished job will not be spotty.

Q — How can I remove those ugly-looking brown stains that are prone to form on the glass partitions in refrigerators?

A — These can be completely dissolved by full-strength peroxide on a soft cloth.

Q — How can I renovate a milk pudding that has become somewhat burnt?

A — Remove the burnt skin, add some milk and a little butter, and then rebake in a slow oven.
