Add 14 tablespoons of flour, into which have been mixed one fourth teaspoon of sait and a few grains of pepper. Stir until thoroughly blended. Gradually pour on one cup of scalded milk adding about one third at a time. stirring until well mixed, then beating until smooth and glossy.

To two cups of bot riced aweet notatoes add three tablespoons of butter, one half teaspoon of sait, a few grains of papper and one beaten egg. Shape in croquettes, dip into crumbs, egg and crumbs again, fry in deep fat and drain.
